In 1979, after the devastation of a decade under tyrannical rule, then-Lieutenant Colonel Teodoro Obiang Nguema Mbasogo took control of the government of Equatorial Guinea. He was named president of the Supreme Military Council, which would lead the nation's transition to participatory democracy. When Equatoguineans voted overwhelmingly for a new constitution in 1982, the Supreme Military Council was abolished and Obiang became president of the Republic of Equatorial Guinea for an initial seven-year term. He was re-elected in 1989, 1996 and 2003.

Since the discovery of substantial oil and natural gas reserves in the mid-to late-1990s, Obiang's government has made significant investments in increasing transparency in its financial practices and diversifying its economy, modernizing its infrastructure, strengthening its public health system, and promoting education to build a strong foundation for the future of the country. Under Obiang's leadership, Equatorial Guinea has reopened schools, expanded primary education, and restored public utilities and roads. Obiang has also made a strategic decision to focus on diversifying the national economy to ensure successful long-term stabilization.

Obiang was born in Akoakam-Esangui, in the Mongomo district in northeast Equatorial Guinea. He was educated in the official school of Mongomo and then by Catholic missionaries. In 1963, he was accepted as a cadet of the Territorial Guard, and later that year, into the General Military Academy of Saragosse, Spain.
